INDUSTRIAL

UNION construction trades are on the job at many major industrial and manufacturing sites across the region.

Since 2009, Chrysler Group LLC has invested more than \$1.5 billion at its four Kokomo transmission plants. North Central Building Trades members build, maintain, and repair these facilities and machinery.

UNION trades completely overhauled the 3.1 million-square-foot Kokomo Transmission Plant, installing and maintaining manufacturing equipment necessary to produce the 8-speed transmission.



Manufacturing environments require a focus on safety, accuracy, and speed. UNION construction provides the expertise gained in years of rigorous apprentice training to bring projects in on time and on budget.









Kokomo is the world's largest producer of transmissions. Chrysler's four plants have more than 5,000 employees and are represented by UAW Locals 685, 1166 and 1302 as well as Building Trades Locals.



COMMERCIAL



YMCA

UNION building trades members created the \$16 million Kokomo Family YMCA, a significant piece of the revitalization of the city's downtown. The 73,000-square-foot facility includes a health and wellness center, lap pool and warm-water instructional pool, walking track, and basketball and racquetball courts.

UNION builders constructed the Kokomo Municipal Parking Garage. The cast-in-place concrete, post-tension building has one level on grade and four elevated stories each with 35,000 square feet of parking space.

The fifth level serves as a podium for lofts@union, a rooftop complex with 35 apartment ranging from efficiencies to two-bedroom units.



EDUCATIONAL

UNION building trades worked on major construction projects for the Kokomo School Corporation including cafeteria and kitchen renovations at Maple Crest Middle School (\$3.5 million), and Central Middle School (\$4.5 million).

A major \$23.1 million expansion at Community Howard Regional Health includes a new intensive care unit, cardiac cath lab, and magnetic resonance imaging facility.









The \$9 million Kokomo Municipal Stadium stadium includes a suite level, concessions, restrooms, and locker rooms for both teams. The facility is specifically designed to host baseball games, but can also be converted for soccer, concerts, or other events. The Kokomo Jackrabbits of the college summer Prospect League, and the Kokomo Wildkats (local high school) will use the stadium as their home field. In its inaugural season, Kokomo Municipal Stadium was named by Ballpark Digest as the 2015 Best Summer Collegiate Facility.





At a new interchange in Tipton County, State Road 28 bridges over U.S. 31 and has single-lane roundabouts designed to accommodate agricultural equipment, large trucks, and future expansion. The design also includes direct access to the Tipton Transmission Plant and a looping ramp for traffic entering southbound U.S. 31.

APPRENTICESHIP

One of the Union's strongest advantages is highly-trained workers. Apprentice programs and on-going Journeyman training assures contractors and customers of a professional, reliable, safe, and skilled workforce ready at all times.

Apprentices work on jobsites while also attending classes to learn industry skills and safety techniques. Wages for apprentices increase over the course of their training, which lasts from two to five years depending on the trade.

An apprentice who graduates to journeyman is recognized as a highly-skilled worker who can command the best wages and benefits.

A Boilermaker erects and maintains various types of pressure vessels.

These include small boilers in schools and hospitals, coal-fired boilers in power generation plants, blast furnaces and basic oxygen furnaces in the steel industry, precipitators and scrubbers which clean the exhaust from these furnaces and boilers, and numerous other tanks and pressurized containment vessels in industrial plants.

Boilermakers Local 374 is a statewide local with 1,200 members. Their hall is located in Hammond, IN with satellite offices in Dale and Terre Haute.

The Boilermakers are dedicated to providing expertise to all companies and owners. Our training centers located in Hammond and Dale train our apprentices in all aspects of the Boilermaker trade. Our new rigging center in Dale is second to none.

All Boilermakers of Local 374 are part of the MOST (Mobilization, Optimization, Stabilization and Training) Program.

This program gives contractors access to members' welding and training certifications 24 hours a day. In this program, 100% of Boilermakers dispatched to jobsites have been drug tested annually and have 10-hour OSHA training.

The Boilermakers started their apprenticeship program in 1968 and it has grown to over 250 apprentices currently enrolled in the four-year program.

In order to graduate, apprentices must complete a minimum of 640 hours of in-class and shop training and 6,000 field construction hours on the jobsite.

The Boilermaker training staff, Nick Tokarz in Hammond and Pete Merkel and Steve Hurm in Dale, provide decades of experience to our apprentices.

Bricklayers are trained and skilled at a multitude of construction trades including bricklaying, pointing, caulking, refractory, erecting and setting pre-cast panels, ceramic tile, marble, stone, and terrazzo.

Local #4 members have been on the job at the Kokomo YMCA, Kokomo downtown parking garage, Municipal Stadium, and Maple Crest Middle School among others.

Established in 1994, Local #4 now has 4,000 members statewide. Membership benefits include competitive wages, medical insurance, pension and savings plans.

The national association is the International Union of Bricklayers and Allied Craftworkers, founded in 1865 and headquartered in Washington, D.C. The oldest continuous Union in North America represents roughly 85,000 skilled masonry-trowel trades workers in the United States and Canada including bricklayers, stone and marble masons, cement masons, plasterers, tilesetters, terrazzo and mosaic workers, and pointers/cleaners/caulkers.

Bricklayers Local #4 offers a four-year training program consisting of 576 classroom and 5,426 on the job hours. Apprentices learn varied aspects of building, industrial, commercial, and residential construction including building walls, partitions, chimneys and other structural forms from brick, block, or other masonry material.

Apprentices also learn building layout, construction math, pattern bonds, masonry wall styles, arch construction, grout and flashing, waterproofing, pointing and cleaning, blueprint reading, welding, rigging, stone setting, and OSHA 10.

Applications are taken year round at www. baclocal4.org. Apprentices can also earn an Associate's Degree in Applied Science.

Advanced classes are offered in welding, first aid/CPR, OSHA certification, construction management, and steward training. Another two lvy Tech classes are required to earn a technical degree and a third for an associate degree, both paid for by the program.

Carpenters are on the job from the foundations of buildings through to the finish trim. They work with many different kinds of materials and tools to build commercial, residential, and institutional structures for

schools, hospitals, and industry. Carpenters are also at work on infrastructure, road, tunnel, and bridge projects.

Local #615's jurisdiction includes Cass, Fulton, Grant, Howard, Miami, Tipton, and Wabash counties in Indiana.

Members are on many major projects in the region including all four Chrysler plants, the Kokomo YMCA, the Kokomo Parking Garage, and Salin Bank. Medical facility work includes Wabash Parkview Hospital and Community Howard Hospital. School work includes Maple Crest, Maconaguah, and Central Middle Schools.

Local #615 was established in 1986 and has 240 members. Membership benefits include medical, dental, vision, pension, annuity, scholarships, and credit union. Carpenter apprentices attend 200 classroom and 1,300 on-the-job hours per year during the four-year apprentice program.

Skills taught include stair forms, ceiling work, flooring, studs/drywall, concrete forms, cabinets, doors/hardware, trim, and welding. Apprentices also earn an Associate's Degree in Applied Science in Construction Technology from Ivy Tech College. The training program also includes free upgrade training to journeymen.

There is no limit to the number of apprentices accepted each year. Applications are taken in person at the school.

Members of Local #18 have been on the job in this area at the Chrysler Casting Plant and Tipton Plant, Community Howard Hospital, Kokomo YMCA, Indiana University Kokomo, and Maple Crest Middle School.

Apprentices complete a four-year training program covering metal layout, blueprint reading, mathematics, safe handling of potentially hazardous materials, OSHA safety, first aid, and CPR.

They spend 144 hours in the classroom, and meet for eight hours every Saturday from January through May or September through January. Apprentices also receive 1,800 hours of on-the-job training.

Special training and upgrade classes are offered including asbestos awareness, abatement, and safety procedures, environmental management practices and monitoring, confined tank entry, fall protection, fire stopping, and changes in the construction industry.

Fire stopping is part of effective compartmentation: "boxes" built within a building or other structure to keep fire from spreading from the room of origin to other parts of the building or other structure.

ASBESTOS & LEAD MITIGATION

The safe and thorough removal and proper disposal of any type of asbesto abatement and lead abatement can include acoustic ceilings, furnace insulations, HVAC ducts, piping, sprayed-on fire proofing, and sound insulation, floor and ceiling tiles.

Electrical Workers install and maintain multiple electrical systems including lighting, receptacles, motor, and motor control systems, building and automation systems, robotics, and monitoring of energy usage, information technology systems and fiber optics.

In this region, Local #873 members performed a total fire alarm system upgrade at Grissom Air Reserve Base (Bunker Hill), a new machinery install at Tipton Chrysler Plant, machinery upgrades at Wabash Paper Mill, new machinery at Pioneer Seed in Tipton, and remodel and electrical upgrades at Marion General Hospital.





IBEW #873 members have also made temperature control upgrades at Eastern school system and Marion VA Hospital, machinery upgrades at all four Chrysler plants, and the new Kokomo baseball stadium.

During a five-year program, apprentices spend 180 classroom hours and 2,000 on-the-job hours each year studying electrical theory, electrical construction, blue prints, wiring schematics, the National Electrical Code, fiber optics, information technology systems, OSHA 10-30 hour, CPR, and NFPA 70E.

Classes are held at the Ivy Tech Kokomo campus. Graduates earn an Associates Degree in Applied Science.

Journeyman upgrades include OSHA 10-30, NFPA 70E and Code of Excellence.

IBEW Local #873 participates in outreach activities including career days at vocational and high schools.






Plumbers install piping and drainage systems for buildings. They also install gas lines, and test piping installations to assure that the systems are functioning properly and meet all plumbing code requirements. Plumbers use a variety of skills, using both hand and power tools for cutting, bending, and threading pipes and making welded and soldered joints.

Pipefitters assemble, install, and maintain pipes to carry water, steam, compressed air, gases, and fluids needed for processing, manufacturing, heating, or cooling. A fitter must be able to adapt and repair pipe systems and install appliances, heating and refrigeration units and do all types of pipe welding. Pipefitters install and repair high-pressure and low-pressure process piping, as well as piping for heating and cooling systems. Steamfitters install the supply lines and return lines of boilers.

HVAC Service Technicians install, troubleshoot, and service heating, ventilation, air conditioning, and refrigeration systems. Technicians must be aware of information concerning the installation and use of solid state controls, state of the art equipment, and methods which must be used to comply with the environmentally safe use and handling of refrigerants. They must also be familiar with all types of modern air conditioning equipment, energy conservation, heat recovery, and sound abatement.

Local #166 members work in 14 counties across northern Indiana: Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Elkhart, Grant, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells, and Whitley.

Career preparation begins with a fiveyear apprenticeship program that includes correspondence courses through Washtenaw Community College, classroom sessions, and onthe-job training.

Safety is first and foremost; apprentices are trained in the care and proper use of tools and equipment. These will range from pipe wrenches and pipe threading machines to welding equipment and man lifts.

Members upgrade each year at special training seminars on new fire protection technology, applications and OSHA safety requirements.

Applications are taken through contractors. An apprentice is paid at a percentage of the journeyman wage. The sprinkler fitter wage rate is negotiated state by state, based on the economic conditions of the state. All apprentices participate in a health and welfare program that provides medical coverage and life insurance. In addition, apprentices start building a pension once they meet requirements to begin participation.

The Sheet Metal trade is varied and diversified. Sheet Metal workers read plans and determine the type and amount of materials and then measure, bend, cut, shape, and attach pieces of sheet metal to make the products. They check the products for accuracy and perform any necessary adjustments.

Members use sheet metal for roofs, rain gutters, siding, ventilation, heating and air-conditioning duct systems. They also assist in the development of restaurant equipment, automobiles, customized precision equipment, outdoor signs, handrails, column wraps, and many other products that are made from metal. They also work with plastic and fiberglass materials.

In the North Central Building Trades jurisdiction, Sheet Metal

Workers are on the job at all four Chrysler plants, the General Motors Stamping Plant expansion, Haynes International, Central Indiana Ethanol (Marion) and Agricor (Marion).

Local #20 members have also worked at the Kokomo YMCA, the Municipal Stadium, the Parking Garage, Community Howard Hospital, Salin Bank in Kokomo, Maple Crest Middle School, and Indiana University Kokomo.

A five-year apprenticeship program requires 204 hours of classroom training and more than 1,860 hours of hands-on experience each year.

Instructors teach blueprint reading, layout, design, computer-aided drafting, welding, air testing and balancing, heating, ventilation and air conditioning service technology, energy management and safety.

Apprentices work in both the field and in the shop utilizing mathematics and pattern layout development methods.

They learn to cut, bend, and shape sheets of metal. They use specialized fastening devices such as bolts, rivets, screws and solder, and use hand and power tools and equipment including shears, breaks, punches and forming presses, edging and crimping machines, hammers, and grinders.

Apprentices also learn to perform all types of welding on all types of materials. Applications are taken year round.

Upgrade classes are offered to all journeymen. Local #20 also participates in the Indiana Union Construction Substance Abuse Trust, promoting safety in the workplace.



Local #20 members also operate a credit union and contribute to a national scholarship program. An independent trust fund helps stabilize earnings and employment.
